

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Curriculum MSc Economics

Semester	Track A (Fast Track to a PhD)	Track B (Specialisation) or Track C (Generalisation)
1st Semester (30 ECTS)	All 3 compulsory modules from the subject area Quantitative Economics: ➤ Advanced Econometrics (10 ECTS) ➤ Advanced Macroeconomics I (10 ECTS) ➤ Advanced Microeconomics I (10 ECTS). On application, 1 compulsory module can be deferred to the 3rd semester.

4th Semester (30 ECTS)	1 module (course) from the Doctoral Programmes à 10 ECTS. Master's thesis (20 ECTS, 3 months). If majoring in a subject area, the Master's thesis must be from the selected subject area.	Master's thesis (30 ECTS, 4 months). For Track B students, majoring in a subject area, the Master's thesis must be from the selected subject area.

Track B

- You can gain any of the five specializations, which will be indicated on your final degree certificate: Econometrics and Applied Economics, International Financial Economics, Macroeconomics and International Economics, Microeconomics and Decision Making, Public Economics
- Semester 2&3: each 24 ECTS from courses and 6 ECTS from a seminar.
- To gain the specialization you need to take the two compulsory courses of the specialization area, as well as two elective courses from the area
- One of your two seminars needs to be in your specialization area, as well as your Master's thesis

Track B Mandatory Courses

Mandatory courses for the different specializations are listed on the <u>MSc Economics</u> <u>Website</u>

Econometrics an Applied Economics:

- Applied Time Series Analysis (summer semester)
- Statistical Learning (summer semester 2023)

International and Financial Economics

- Risk Management (summer semester)
- Portfolio Management (winter semester)

Macroeconomics and International Economics

- Advanced Macroeconomics II (summer term)
- International Monetary Economics (summer term)

Track B Mandatory Courses

Microeconomics and Decision Making

- Advanced Microeconomics II (summer semester)
- Behavioral Economics (winter semester)

Public Economics

- Labor Economic (summer semester 2023)
- Pick one additional out of the following: Labor Economics I (if offered summer semester), Labour Markets and Inequality (winter semester), Economics of Education (winter semester), Political Economy (if offered)

Track C

- Track, which gives you the most freedom to follow your own interests
- No specialization on your degree certificate
- Semester 2 & 3: each 24 ECTS from courses and 6 ECTS from a seminar from any specialization area
- Master's thesis in any subject area of the MSc Economics

Track A

- Does not lead to a PhD automatically
- Is most interesting if you are likely going to do your PhD in Konstanz or if you are very keen on studying on a PhD level
- You can gain a specialization as well, same conditions apply as in Track B
- Semester 2: 24 ECTS from courses and 6 ECTS from a seminar
- Semester 3: 3 courses from the Doctoral Programme (10 ECTS each); at least two of the following courses: Topics in Advanced Econometrics, Topics in Advanced Microeconomics, Topics in Advanced Macroeconomics
- Semester 4: 1 course of the Doctoral Programme and Master's thesis

Choosing your track

When and how do I choose my track?

The latest time to choose your track is when you register for your Master's thesis. Exception, if you would like to study in Track A, please indicate this at the beginning of the second semester.

However, be aware that by choosing your courses you are making a decision already. You cannot gain a specialization, when you do not have the courses.

Course registration

Please note that you have to register for all courses you would like to take via ZEuS (seminars are excluded)

- Finish the registration before you attend a session
- You will be added to the Ilias folder once you have registered via ZEuS
- The registration period is 4 April (9am) until 25 April 2022
- First come, first served
- The course registration is not an exam registration!
- You can find an explanation on how to register for courses in the ZEuS Wiki

Retaking exams

- You have to register for all the exams you would like to take in the second or third semester
- The exception: We will register you for seminars
- If you failed a course in the elective area or did not attend due to illness, you are required to retake it. As soon as the course is offered again, you will be registered automatically for the exam. If the course is not offered again, you are free to choose another course.
- Once during your studies you are allowed to put in a request not to retake an exam you failed and instead choose another course.
- You are only allowed to fail an exam once. If you fail an exam twice, you have to put in a request to the examination board for a third try. It is only possible to request this twice during your studies.
